The Garden Center is a godsend—allowing us to unite most Ranch operations under one roof, improving communications and internal *esprit de corps*.

The Garden Center was made possible through a grant from an anonymous West Texas foundation.

January 2nd we moved.
"Mustard Seed," as the old
mobile home was known, served as
office, camp, home, and corporate
headquarters for 12 years.

Was it adequate? Heavens no! Our tiny gas stove was so slow we had to put water on for the supper spaghetti at ten a.m.during camp.

The nurse slept on a cot in Jerry's office. When it rained we huddled on the deck or in the tiny living room, forsaking leaky tents.

Over the years things got worse. We memorized where the holes were in the floor under the carpet, dancing deftly around them.

Mice made their presence known, occasionally surprising with a personal visit. And each heavy rain or wind resulted in a progressive exfoliation of roof tin and exterior siding.

But the last straw came when the phone rang, I answered it, and before the calling party could say a word a huge wooly spider dropped abruptly from the ceiling, inches from my face.

I shrieked and flung the phone on the desk as I fell backward. The caller was gone when I returned, and I still wonder who it was.

Yet today, walking into our new offices, *sans* wildlife, it's as natural as if we'd been doing it forever.

We may think the quality of the facilities doesn't make a big difference—that the main thing is the heart we put into our work. But the truth is, it does.

For one thing, we're all under one roof now and communication is far better. Computers are being net-worked, file cabinets are accessible, and we have work spaces for the specific jobs we do, and (finally!) a place for everything.

Most important, we can do a better job for those we serve.

For that, we thank the foundation (which wishes to remain anonymous) that funded this great new building.
