## **MEANINGFUL JOBS**

From the very beginning, Down Home Ranch has always supported the development of meaningful jobs for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). Here on the Ranch, job creation occurred to address the essential day-to-day operations including cleaning the buildings, working in the greenhouse, caring for the animals and general maintenance. The goal was not only to fill a crucial labor need, but also to support those who want to work with the opportunity to develop skills and self-respect from a job well done. Until August of 2017, the Vocational Program, which provides training and support to Ranchers to obtain and maintain employment, was exclusively utilized to develop and support on-the-ranch jobs. In order to broaden the scope of the Ranch's Vocational Program, resources were invested in the development of a full time Team Lead position. The Team Lead position not only provides one-on-one training on the Ranch, but also supports Ranchers interested in jobs in the city of Elgin and surrounding communities. (continued on page 2)



### MEANINGFUL JOBS, CONTINUED

The Ranch quickly identified an internal candidate who proved to have the skills and passion for supporting Ranchers to find and maintain meaningful employment. In order to develop a program based on best practices, the Vocational Team Lead's first assignment was to obtain the job coach certification through the University of North Texas. Through this continuing education, the Team Lead began the task of developing a person-centered program built on assessment and careful planning using specific timelines, meaningful curriculum and structured skills training. The first referral from the Ranch Case Manager, to support a Rancher to find a job off the Ranch, was January 2, 2018. Since that time, there have been a total of seven Ranchers referred, of which five are now employed with HEB, Camp DRIVE, City of Elgin Recreation Center and Skinny Lane Farms.

As the Vocational Program has developed, there has been a learning curve full of discovery and opportunity. There are three incremental steps to supporting an individual to become employed. First is the prevocational skills training that typically occurs during Day Program. This step focuses on general exposure to different work environments, how to complete assigned tasks and guidance on soft skills such as how to interact professionally with others. Second is the employee assistance, encompassing all activities between deciding to look for a job and getting a job offer, including the job search and mock interviews. Lastly, once a Rancher receives a job, they move into supported employment. This step can include transportation to work, facilitating meetings between Ranchers and managers and more structured time teaching job tasks. All of the services in supported employment are based on assessment and needs that have been identified through the different stages of the vocational process.

In addition to supporting Ranchers to be employed on and off the Ranch, the Vocational Program, in conjunction with our Enterprise Center, created a consignment program to support those who are interested in creating desirable and unique handmade pieces. Ranchers create and sell their handcrafted works through consignment in our gift shop and at local farmers markets, festivals and art shows. To get started, the Rancher must first contract with Down Home Ranch to sell their pieces. In exchange, the Rancher has access to a private draft table were they can work during independent art times. Many of the Ranchers have open access to their space in the evenings and on the weekends for whenever the creative moment strikes. Recently, one Rancher was requested to make pot holders for a local restaurant that will be used by wait staff and in the kitchen. The Ranchers create a wide variety of interesting pieces that include tote bags, mixed media and commissioned art pieces.

The future is brighter than ever to support more individuals with IDD to have access to the things that add purpose to all of our lives. The growth that the Vocational Program has enjoyed is directly related to the hard work of our employees and willingness of our local communities to partner, as well as the donors who choose to support Down Home Ranch through the *Voice for Choice* monthly giving program and other fundraising opportunities.

# CRAIG RUSSELL Executive Director

"Being a parent to children with intellectual disabilities is what first drove my passion for this work."

Craig's journey at Down Home Ranch started as a volunteer in 2012, assisting with technology while also fixing bikes for the Ranchers. He took his first formal position at DHR in 2013 with Operations and Day Program while continuing to work with technology and development. Craig's involvement grew in 2014, when he accepted the position of Chief Operating Officer. He was then named Executive Director in 2017, and has focused on a commitment to increase supports provided to the Ranchers as well as creating more choices and opportunities.

### COMMUNITY

I recently had a death in the family and had to fly home for the funeral. My mother fought a brave battle against cancer that ended February 27, 2018. As we made the necessary preparations for the funeral, I learned things about my mom that I did not know. My brother Jeff and I went about the tasks of putting her affairs in order. We went to her bank to inform them of the situation and the teller began to cry. She told us about a time when she was going through some personal trials and my mom called her every day to check on and comfort her. We went to a retail store and one of my mother's neighbors approached us and told us that every day she would stop by my mom's house while walking her dog and talk with my mom. She appreciated the time they spent together. She told us her dog still tries to pull her towards my mom's house when they walk by. My mom was very close with her neighbors and they looked out for each other. As I listened to these stories and more, I realized the impact my mom had on her community. It was not the fact that her house was in a certain location or that she banked at a specific place, it was the interaction that she had with the people around her during her life.

Similarly, it is not where Down Home Ranch is located, but it is the interaction of the Ranchers and staff members within the greater community which creates the impact. As I look at the progress we have made at DHR over the last couple of years, I know that we are on the right path. We have made community engagement a cornerstone of our Day Program. We ensure there are opportunities for each Rancher to participate, where they choose, in the community. We opened up our programs to non-residents so we could better serve our community, and are currently working on further expanding services to the community through satellite programs. We are fulfilling the requests of our Ranchers to work in the city of Elgin through our Vocational Program. All of these opportunities and programs are creating a bond between our Ranchers and the community we serve. I look forward to hearing the stories of the special relationships that will certainly become a part of their lives and ours.

### LUNTEERS IN DAY PROGRAM By Program Specialist Heidi Lersch

The Down Home Ranch Day Program presents Ranchers with opportunities to learn and develop new skills, pursue vocational experiences and express themselves in a positive atmosphere that promotes personal growth and fosters com-

munity. They are encouraged to explore, engage and give back to their community through volunteerism and educational outings. In addition, the DHR Day Program offers a wide range of continuing education courses on the Ranch. The courses, which are based on the Ranchers' interests, are created and rotated on a quarterly basis.

We are looking for volunteers who are enthusiastic, compassionate and seeking to have a positive impact on the lives of others. Read on to find out more about the various areas to volunteer and support the Ranchers in the DHR Day Program.

The DHR Vocational Program supports Ranchers seeking employment on and off the Ranch. The program facilitates job skill development starting with the application and interview process, continuing on through employment. New this year, the program is growing to accommodate and encourage job opportunities outside of the Ranch. With this expansion, there is a need for volunteers to assist in transporting Ranchers to and from their employment on weekdays and weekends.

In addition to vocational opportunities in the community, the Ranchers also engage in volunteer work. They currently assist the Bastrop Animal Shelter, Shepherd's Heart Food Pantry in Taylor, Elgin Nursing and Rehabilitation Center and the City of Elgin. The Ranchers participating in the volunteer program are enthusiastic about giving back! Volunteers who are interested in assisting Ranchers at volunteer sites are currently needed to provide individual or small group support at locations in Bastrop, Elgin and Taylor.

While on the Ranch, Ranchers enjoy creating art, sewing and embroidering products to sell. They learn to express themselves artistically through a wide variety of media. Ranchers'

> and community events, in turn creating additional income for the Rancher artists. In the future, we are hoping to guide the Ranchers interested in production, into the creating and selling of their own products as their own small business. We are in need of volunteers who are available to help work weekend events at the Bastrop and Lexington Farmers Markets, as well as to assist on weekdays, sorting and organizing art and production materials.

# VOLUNTEER VIEW: RONA TRACY

Rona has been a special part of the Down Home Ranch family for many years. She visits DHR once a year with the Sunnybrook Church from Stillwater, OK on their annual mission trip. We feel so blessed that Rona found Down Home Ranch many years ago and never turned back. Here's a little more about her story:

#### What motivated you to volunteer with Down Home Ranch?

The year was 2007, and I was sitting on the couch holding our infant daughter Willa. While channel flipping I happened to catch a segment on the national news about Down Home Ranch. I was so intrigued that I immediately went to my computer to look up more information. We had been very surprised when Willa was diagnosed with Down syndrome about eight days after her birth. While working through the shock and concern, my thoughts immediately turned to what her future would look like. When I saw the news clip about Down Home Ranch, I latched onto the picture of hope and possibility that the Ranch presented. My husband Dan and I made plans to visit the Ranch on a future trip to Texas. During our first brief visit, we found out that volunteers had built the barn at the Ranch. We looked at each other and decided on the spot that we would try to gather a group from our church to return and do some volunteer work. That was almost ten years ago. We've made nine trips in the past ten years. God has been our guide all the way. It was somewhat unlike us to initiate a mission trip. Our hearts were just so drawn to the Ranch. Many great volunteers have joined us over the years – over 250 total, primarily from Stillwater, OK.



# What makes volunteering at Down Home Ranch a meaningful use of your time?

The joy our family has found in spending time at the Ranch cannot be described. Initially, our motivation was all about our own child, and seeing the possibilities for Willa's future. Over time, we have been motivated more by the relationships we have built with the Ranchers and staff and the beautiful community we now feel a part of. In addition to Willa, we have two teenagers. They enjoy going to the Ranch as much as we do. They feel a sense of acceptance there – a sense of community not always found in the world at large.

#### What is the biggest personal benefit that you've received as a volunteer?

Personally, the very existence of the Ranch gives me so much hope for Willa's future. I'm not sure it will be the perfect fit for her, but just knowing a place like this is possible fills me with peace. Also, I'm so thankful that our time spent at the Ranch seems to be making the world just a bit better for Willa and her peers that live with special needs. Simply put, the Ranch is an incubator for advocates. I have learned so much from everyone at the Ranch. Many of our Oklahoma volunteers return home to become powerful advocates in their own corner of the world, due to their experience volunteering at DHR.

#### What do you wish other people knew about working with individuals with disabilities?

That there is nothing to fear. And that the level of need does not define a person's worth or limit their contribution to this world. Sometimes those that have the highest level of need are the ones that offer the most blessing to others. After all, every human needs some level of help to make it in this world.

#### What would you tell someone who is thinking about volunteering at the Ranch?

Just give it a try. You will be amazed at what you learn. You may go into the experience trying to "help" and then realize later that you are the one that received the blessing. You won't find a more welcoming place to use your skills and make a difference.


